RELATIONSHIP SKILLS

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The Supply Chain is involved at different steps in the production chain, and at the crossroads of many different types of jobs (purchasing, production, quality assurance, etc.). But the decisive criteria are personal qualities, since these are demanding jobs in which often complex situations may require quick decision-making.

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
